



Demystify

The CNS consists of the brain and spinal cord.





You skin is a sense organ. It touches a hot pan and the sensory neurons carry the signal to the relay neurons in the central nervous system. The relay neurones pass the signal to the motor neuron that carries the signal to the muscles and you move your hand.

The myelin sheath coats the axon and allows electrical impulses to travel faster.

A synapse is where two neurones meet.

A neurotransmitter is a chemical that carries the message across the synapse.



Maths

Design and present an A3 poster to show your dream home. Include a scale drawing with measurements and some costings.

Requirements:

- Create a scale drawing of your house you will need a separate drawing for each floor and will need to include the garden. Be careful when choosing your scale as it must all fit on one A3 sheet.
- Your scale drawing of the house should include: a living room, kitchen, bedrooms, bathroom(s) and a garage. You also need to show doors, windows and stairs, plus a hall if you wish. To help, a standard door is 90cm wide.
- You must include a scale for your scale drawing and, for each room, you must give the actual dimensions and the floor area. This can be included on your scale drawing or in a separate table.
- To improve your scale drawing you can add some furniture, drawn to scale. This could be a complete set of furniture in one room or small amounts of furniture in all the rooms. Approximate sizes of some furniture are shown in the table below but don't just stick to this list, you can estimate the size of other pieces of furniture and include these too. As with each room you must include the actual dimensions of each piece of furniture and make sure that it all fits into the room. This can again be stated on your scale drawing or in a table.
- Now choose your flooring. You can either have carpet at £20 per m², wood at £40 per m², laminate at £15 per m², tiles at £25 per m² or stone at £50 per m². You can also have a mixture of flooring. Once you have chosen, calculate the cost of flooring for your house.

Student notes

Possible extensions:

- Students could use the internet to research exact dimensions of specific furniture that they wish to add.
- Students could be asked to cost more of the build. Using the internet, they (or you) could find the costs of bricks, roof tiles, furniture, and other materials. Possibly even the labour involved.
- For a shorter task, students could be asked just to complete the scale drawing of the house without furniture or costings.

3 – The world also has some hope.	
4 - People need to 'let go' of small, insignificant issues.	

The poem struggles to create a straightforward meaning, but there are some key themes and ideas you should be aware of. **Task** – find a quote to support each of the following ideas:

- 1. Paper is importance for recording our history.
- 2. The **paradox** (contradiction, opposites) that paper is fragile, yet it still controls our lives.
- 3. Life is more complex and precious than other things we create or build.
- 4. Life is temporary but each one life forms part of a bigger and ongoing story.
